Screen Time- Survey of PEI students in Grades 7 – 12.


Based on the survey students spend an average of almost 8 hours on screens a day.

Screen time



What is the right amount of screen time for my child?

The Canadian Paediatric Society recommends:

- For children two to five years **old** limit screen time to less than one hour a day.
- For children older than **five** limit screen time to less than two hours a day.

How do I establish healthy screen habits at home?

Try to establish screen time limits and appropriate habits early in childhood, as it will be easier than setting them later when children have established patterns and routines. Ensure that everyone in your family understands and shares the same understanding of acceptable limits and content. Some tips:

- Be a good role model with your own screen time.
- Turn off TV during mealtimes.
- Turn off background TV when no one is watching.
- Avoid using screens an hour before bedtime.
- Choose activities such as playing outdoors, reading or crafting over

ATTENDANCE: The Public School Branch has an attendance policy to help us monitor student attendance. We always appreciate regular communication with parents and caregivers. You can contact Ms. Stephanie in the office and the classroom teacher if your child is going to be absent. Please try to have your student in school for the full day unless there is an appointment or other specific reason for late drop off or early pick up to ensure minimum disruption for our classes. Our school day runs from 8:50 - 2:50.

Here is some information on the importance of Attendance:

DID YOU KNOW?

- Starting in preschool and kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10%, or about 2 days each month over the course of a school year, can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just 1 or 2 days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences and tardiness can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school-and themselves.

Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Eventually good attendance will be a skill that will help them succeed in high school and college.

YOUR SCHOOLS ARE TESTING **FOR RADON:**

Now It's time to Test Your Home!

The Public Schools Branch is working in collaboration with Health Canada on a plan to test the radon levels in schools in the province to help keep your children safe. We will test all schools over a 3-year period, beginning this year's testing November 2023. Upon completion of the testing, the results will be

analyzed, and any necessary actions will be completed that are required based on the results of the testing.

WHAT IS RADON?

Radon is a colourless, odourless radioactive gas that comes from the breakdown of uranium in the ground. You can't see it or smell it. When radon gas seeps inside an enclosed space, such as a home or workplace, it can build up to high levels and become a health risk.

All homes and buildings have some level of radon and any building can have high radon levels regardless of geographic location. The only way to determine if a building has high radon levels is to test, which is why it's important that all schools are tested. Detectors will be placed in schools for a minimum of 91 days and then sent to a lab for analysis. They do not emit any radon.

WHAT ARE THE HEALTH RISKS OF RADON?

Radon is the leading cause of lung cancer in people who don't smoke.

Given that the health risk associated with radon is based on the cumulative exposure, minimizing potential radon levels in schools will reduce the lifetime risk of developing lung cancer for the people occupying them.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Exposure to radon at home contributes to 90% of Canadians radon-induced lung-cancer risk.

There are two easy and inexpensive options to stay safe:

- 1. Purchase a do-it-yourself long-term test kit.
- 2. Hire a certified radon measurement professional.

TEST BETWEEN SEPTEMBER AND APRIL when windows and doors are mostly closed.
